

CLOPTON PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2016-17

This year we were pleased to welcome Cllr Robin Vickery as our County Council representative and I congratulate him on his recent election success which sees his representation secured for the next 4 years.

Six meetings of the Parish Council were held during the year, as scheduled.

Changes

There were no changes to the members of the Council during the year and I wish to thank all participants for their work and effort. Two vacancies continue to remain unfilled.

I should like to thank Tony Fryatt for his on-going work as our District Councillor for the Grundisburgh ward and for the insight he gives us into the various aspects of the planning process though his participation in the planning committees.

Accounts

Total receipts for the year amounted to £7,754.55 but £1,975.31 of this represents a grant from SCDC for Playing Place Funding which was received during March and which sat on the account over the year end before being paid out. Thus the underlying receipts totalled £5,779.24, of which £3,700 came from the Precept, £59.54 from the Council Tax Support Grant (which has now ceased), £1,425.55 as fête income, £250.64.00 for Transparency Funding and the remainder from sundry other sources.

Total gross expenditure exceeded the income and amounted to £6,306.65 which included £1,355.32 fête and charitable disbursements. General Reserves at 31 March 2017 stood at £5,657.38, a reduction of £326.16 over the year.

The Voluntary First Registration of the village hall land with the Land Registry was completed at a net cost of £686.00 which was partially met from reserves as the cost had not been budgeted. As a consequence of the original deeds not being available, a period of 12 years must elapse before absolute title is granted.

The precept for 2017/18 remains unchanged at £3,700.00 for the 5th consecutive year.

Planning Applications

Thirteen new planning applications were validated during the year, eleven of which were approved, one was refused and one Listed Building Consent is awaiting decision. A further application lodged in the previous year was withdrawn. The most significant application was for the RDA move to Shop Farm, for which the construction of a new access road on to the Monewden Road, which appears well on the way to completion, will obviate any need to use Shop Road once the development work is complete.

Events, Topics & Issues

Following the finalisation of the new Area Specific Policy relating to the former Debach airfield site, a director of Clopton Commercial park presented the Parish Council at the

January meeting with an overview of the development so far and their vision for the future, which will focus on business units and starter units for smaller business, which should not incur HGV traffic. The Parish Council was encouraged by this presentation, given that a sympathetic development would improve the amenities for business in the parish.

It is hoped that the incidents of flooding in Shop Road has finally been resolved after the owner of an adjacent property put the matter in the hands of his insurers. A survey showed that roots for a willow tree were blocking a drainage pipe and remedial work to replace the section of affected pipe has been completed.

Engineers from SCC have recently attended Shop Road to mark out potholes scheduled for repair. SCC is also scheduled to replace a broken footpath sign adjacent to Pear Tree Farm at some point.

Traffic Speed:

The Parish Council finally succeeded in obtaining a copy of the consultant's report on the state of the B1078 between Coddenham and Wickham Market via a third party and duly enquired from SCC what their intentions were in respect of implementing the recommendations it set out for the link passing through Clopton. Despite chasing, there has been no response. It transpires that the report was commissioned by SCC at a reported cost of £30,000 as a trial process for a wider number of projects in the County and with no intention of implementing any proposals as there was no budget in place to fund them. This somewhat explains the initial response from the responsible Cabinet member before the report was sighted that SCC would be doing no more than monitoring developments. The Parish Council is currently working with SAVID for the possible use of a SID on appropriate stretches of roads in the parish subject to a 30 mph speed limit.

The third village fête held at the Village Hall on 19 June 2016 was another success with £600.00 being donated to the Blue Cross and £250.00 to the village hall. The fête committee subsequently decided that it was time for a 'breather' and no event is planned for this year.

The parish notice board on the corner of Shop Road and Rouse Hall Gardens has been subjected to repeated vandalism and the broken glass and Perspex presents a safety risk. At its forthcoming meeting this evening, the Parish Council will debate the permanent removal of this notice board.

Concerns over vandalism led the Parish Council not to proceed with a suggested installation of a defibrillator in the village, given alternative availability in Otley and Grundisburgh.

Once again, The Council would like to thank Della Hughes for her hard work in running the Clopton News email and the village website, which so many of us take for granted but which undoubtedly represent a significant contribution to our community.

Local Plan Review

We will be holding a series of workshops specifically for town and parish council representatives. The purpose of the workshops is to introduce them to the local plan review process and what will be happening over the next couple of years, but more specifically, to get their thoughts and ideas on what they think makes a sustainable community and how planning policies might be used to help with this. We will then use the feed back from these workshops to help inform the content of the issues and options consultation document which will be subject to formal consultation in the summer.

We are hoping that as many towns and parishes will send representatives as possible

We will be offering 1:1 meetings with towns and parishes during the actual Issues and Options consultation period.

Deben Leisure Centre Redevelopment

The Leisure Centre is now scheduled to close for the redevelopment in September this year and should be completed by the Summer of 2018. Work is expected to take 10 months and should provide leisure facilities to meet modern expectations.

Devolution Plans

Much effort in 2016 was put during into developing plans for devolution of powers for Suffolk and Norfolk councils, with an elected Mayor. Suffolk councils voted in favour but not all of the Norfolk councils. Consequently, the proposals were dropped.

Suffolk Coastal And Waveney Districts to Amalgamate.

After close cooperation for many years, it has been agreed that Suffolk Coastal and Waveney Districts will formally combine to form a new District to be called East Suffolk District Council. It is intended that this should be in time for the District council elections in 2019. By creating a new, larger and more influential council, we will be able to keep costs down, enabling us to maintain and improve the services that local people depend on.

SCDC Office Move

We have moved from our old buildings at Melton Hill and are now well established in East Suffolk House, Riduna Park, Melton. The official opening of the new building will take place on 15 June 2017.

New 'one stop shop' officially opened at Woodbridge Library

The new shared customer services facility in Woodbridge Library was officially opened today in May and allows us to provide better customer services to local people by dealing with more things at the first point of contact. By creating this 'one stop shop' for Suffolk Coastal services at Woodbridge Library our Customer Services Team can deal with a wide range of enquiries, including council tax, housing benefits, tourism and much more. People can also be able to make appointments to see staff from other Council services, such as Planning.

Implementation of Civil Parking Enforcement in East Suffolk.

We had a key decision to make on whether we should take over responsibility for parking enforcement. Suffolk is one of the few counties in England where district councils do not have this responsibility, and parking enforcement is still carried out by the police.

The lack of enforcement action is seen in communities across the district, with mounting discontent over 'unpoliced' illegal parking – in particular at pinch points around schools. There are significant safety issues associated with this and, under current arrangements, District Councils are powerless to enforce a solution. CPE would provide those powers. The law permits the responsibility for parking enforcement to be transferred from the police to local authorities and income from tickets stays with the authority, potentially enabling self-funding.

Exemplar Grant programme

Suffolk Coastal District Council announced the launch of a new grant programme in October.

The Enabling Communities Exemplar Programme looks to assist community initiatives with grant funding to deliver new 'flagship' projects that will have a significant impact on communities and tackle need in a sustainable way. Voluntary and community organisations can apply for grant assistance between £1,000 and £10,000 to help a specific project or activity across our communities at a ward or across multiple wards that need more funding than is available through the Enabling Communities Budgets.

To be eligible for funding, the project must be supported by the relevant Ward Councillor or the relevant Cabinet Member(s). The Exemplar Programme has no set deadlines, so you can apply at any time and a decision will be made within 8 weeks of Council Officers receiving your complete application.

There has been £132,000 of funding set aside to fund projects through this programme, which can be spent on costs to fund a new community project or help fund new community capital projects, please check grant criteria before applying.

Carried out speed monitoring in variety of locations using both speed camera and speed indicating device. Worked with and supported Community Speed Watch schemes in operation on the district. In May 149 vehicles surveyed speeding by volunteers in your community with a speedwatch scheme.

Carried out, as often as possible, patrols of hotspots for parking offences giving advice or issuing fixed penalty notices. The Special Constabulary have also contributed and patrolled areas, issuing tickets as necessary.

Continued to work with partners to address concerns of ASB use of vehicles around Martlesham and Woodbridge using patrols and ASB legislation. To date we have sent out over 35 warning letters and extra patrols being planned. Tesco are potentially planning signage as first positive step and SNT ASB team being implemented for summer months.

Communications: Annual Report for Clopton APM - 18 May 2017

This year the parent company of the Clopton website, Onesuffolk.net, decided to off-load the village websites as maintenance of the sites was considered too expensive after county council budget cuts. Community Action Suffolk has taken over the village websites, but has been forced to bring in a maintenance charge to each participating parish council of £50.00. Clopton Parish Council decided to make the payment to keep our website running, at least for the first year. There have been some problems gaining access to the Clopton website for administration recently, but this is probably due to the installation, by Community Action Suffolk, of upgraded software. I have also found it difficult to keep the website as up-to-date as I would wish due to time restraints.

Clopton eNews: (cloptonnews@gmail.com)

Over the last two years there have been increasing problems with delivery of the Clopton News email. It seems we have become victims of our own success and, because we have nearly 100 subscribers, bulk emails have been continually rejected as spam by Google's screening process. I therefore had to change the email delivery system and Clopton News is now delivered via Google Groups. Maximum privacy, security and access settings have been applied to the new group, which should make it a very safe system. The original Clopton News email address (cloptonnews@gmail.com) has been retained for individual contacts. All 97* Clopton email recipients were informed of the change to Googlegroups and all have stayed with us.

Also this year we formed an alliance with Grundisburgh News. They send us copies of their local news which they think may interest us and we reciprocate. This is working very well so far and both villages are receiving news of more local events and items of interest.

2016 was a very busy year for the church.

In May we held a Flower Festival. There were twenty eight arrangements and we raised over £900 which will be used for repairs to the building (Total needed £26,400!)

There was a concert by Illuminati in June and on the weekend of the Queens official 90th birthday we held a picnic followed by Songs of Praise.

We held the annual Strawberry Tea in June which also raised funds for repairs.

After the Harvest Service we sent six large boxes of produce to the Salvation Army Hostel for the homeless in Ipswich.

The Remembrance Service was held as usual at the 493rd Bombardment Group memorial. The Yallop family and the Taylors organized this and provided wonderful refreshments afterwards at the Education Centre.

Carol singing around part of the village raised £186 for the Tree House Children's Hospice in Ipswich


The Christmas Candlelight Carol Service was very well attended and we sent £263 to the Syrian Refugee Council in Ipswich.

The bell ringers are doing well and have rung for many of the services. The bells are classed as grade 10 which is the highest grade. There have been several visiting bands during the year. The Heritage information at the back of the church has had quite a lot of visitors, many people commenting on how good it is to find information about the village. The website has been very popular with 8,007 visits during the year.

Two talks were given this year. The first, by Peter Driver, was entitled "Suffolk Curiosities" and focused on peculiarities found in Suffolk architecture and buildings. The second, by David Newman was an interesting talk about Smuggling in Suffolk, at which we discovered that it was more than possible that teams of donkeys, laden with contraband were once led through Clopton in the dead of night! Both talks were well attended with all profits being donated to charity.

A further meeting was held in the village hall on 19th May at which the Heritage Group displayed all documents and pictures currently held, in addition to a display entitled "Who lived in your house". Residents were able to identify their house on a large map of Clopton and find out, from old census forms and records, the previous tenants of their house. All heritage records are currently on display in the church.

W J Steel & Poor's Charity no 211366

Report to Clopton Annual Parish Meeting 2017 - 18 May 2017

W.J.Steel & Poor's Charity was set up in the 19th century to offer assistance to Clopton residents with financial or disability problems.

The capital is invested in Charities Investment Fund Units and, at the end of the last financial year on 31st December 2016, stood at £493.48.

This produced an income of £16.40. There was an accumulation of income of £99.40.

Despite the best efforts of the trustees to publicise the fund, we have once again received no direct applications for help from Clopton residents.

The trustees have learned that several Clopton households receive Christmas parcels from Woodbridge Lions Club each year, and decided that this would be a worthy scheme for the charity to support. A donation of £100 was sent in November and a letter of thanks received from the Treasurer.

Clopton Village Hall Management Committee - Report to Clopton Annual Parish Meeting 2017

Achievements in the past year

The last year has been very productive, completing some work started last year and some new work undertaken this year.

These include:

- Help from people of the village to thoroughly clean and fully redecorate the hall
- Fundraising for, and then replacing the curtains with fully lined and fireproofed material which should have a long life. The lobby curtains were replaced with a simple blind which seemed more fitting for this space.
- Replacing the original refrigerator with an A-rated larder fridge
- Replacing the old bulky microwave cooker with a new smaller and simpler one.
- Arranging the installation of swings on the playing field alongside the existing play trail. The funding came from SCDC play-space funds, Adnams charity, village fete monies held by the PC and Village Hall reserve money.
- Work has been done on several days in the winter to get the overgrown hedges and shrubs into shape and to cut the laid hedge next to the car park. This work was done by people from the village.

General Maintenance

The main items this year have been:

- Several repairs to the oil-fired heating system at significant cost.
- Replacement of fluorescent lamps as needed.
- Repairs to gutters and downpipes as needed.

These maintenance needs are increasing as the original building components reach the end of their life. Maintenance costs can only increase.

There are some outstanding maintenance jobs yet to be costed and planned. These include replacement of the external kitchen door, improved drainage by the main entrance, repairs/ replacement of external woodwork and rainwater goods.

Our own village stalls this year included a beer tent, which was a new venture that will be repeated in future.

Everyone had a very enjoyable time and thanks must go to the hard-working volunteers who put in so much effort to bring the fete together and to the village hall maintenance committee who rent us the hall at preferential rates and make sure the grass is cut.

Thanks also to Carle Vince for so generously providing all the advertising boards that go up around the village, to Anthony Ling of Grange farm for loaning us straw bales to sit on, Debach Enterprises for the loan of the trailer for the stage, all the wonderful cooks who supplied us with the luscious cakes for the refreshment room and everyone who donated prizes, gifts, items for stalls and, most of all, time.
